In short, HB 142 and HB 143 would ban most individual "gifts" from lobbyists, while broadening requirements for lobbyist registration and granted expanded authority to the State Ethics Commission. Three years ago, Speaker Ralston led the charge for ethics reform, but has recently come under fire for his verbal opposition to a "total gift ban," arguing that it's insolvent. However, he recently accepted the results of a 2012 non-binding referendum in which Georgia

As drafted, the legislation did exempt legislative committees, sub- committees, and caucuses. As drafted, the legislation as currently drafted is being strongly opposed by members of Common Cause and the Tea Party. They said that the legislation would restrict their ability to petition their government. As the committee process continued, Speaker Ralston introduced several amendments to his legislation. Those amendments include: - Reducing the lobbyist registration fee from \$300 to \$25 for all registrants - Restricts spending on legislator travel and travel for legislative spouses - Allows the waiver of reporting requirements if individual advocates swear an affidavit not to spend on legislators - Allows advocates to bypass the lobbyist registration process if they aren't at the Capitol more than five days each year. Speaker Ralston's ethics legislation will be heard on the House floor Monday. (Monitor) This is the second of Speaker Ralston's two ethics bills.

As \$.92 of every investment dollar in Georgia comes from other states, Georgia lags grossly behind her neighboring states in the area of technology investment. Under this legislation, Georgia, over the next five years, would sell insurance premium tax credits to insurance companies. The system would begin with \$10 million in 2014 and extend to \$35 million in 2018. The system will be overseen by a 5- member appointed board. The Board will hire a third party administrator who will select venture capital funds to manage investment activities in Georgia. 100% of the investment tax dollars will be returned to InvestGeorgia, as well as 80% of the investment profit. The legislation has been endorsed by the Georgia Chamber as a scorecard issue, and is being carried by Representatives Allen Peake (R - Macon) and Ed Lindsey (R - Atlanta). It has been assigned to the Ways and Means Committee.

However, manufacturers of these substances have changed their formulas so as to avoid the legal effects of these provisions. This bill seeks to once again ban these substances by adding to the definition of Schedule I controlled substances. Rick Allen, Director of the Georgia Drug and Narcotic Agency, testified in favor of the legislation and it passed committee unanimously.
