

Georgia Bio Legislative Watch February 7, 2022 Legislative Days 9 - 11

GENERAL INFORMATION:

Committee meetings ramped up this week under the Gold Dome with several Georgia Bio bills in committee. House Bill 918, sponsored by Chairman Mike Cheokas, would establish a Rare Disease Advisory Council (RDAC) in Georgia. The bill was presented to the House Health & Human Services Committee on Tuesday, but after a few language clarifications were raised by the Department of Public Health, no action was taken. Chairman Sharon Cooper said the bill would move, and we expect to see a revised version in committee for a vote tomorrow.

The substitute to House Bill 867, the Truth in Prescription Pricing for Patients Act, was heard on the House Floor on Thursday, passing by a vote of 161-1. The bill now goes to the Senate where we expect it will be assigned to the Health & Human Services Committee and where we will follow its progress. You can find the full bill text HERE.
